


Eagles attend College Night:

Hispanic Heritage Month

Hispanic Heritage Month is an annual celebration in the United States that takes place from September 15th to October 15th. During this month, Americans honor and celebrate the contributions, culture, history, and heritage of Hispanic and Latino Americans, who have roots in Spanish-speaking countries from Latin America, Spain, and other Spanish-speaking regions.

The significance of starting Hispanic Heritage Month on September 15th is that it marks the anniversary of the independence of several Latin

American countries, including Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua, which all declared their independence from Spanish colonial rule on September 15, 1821. Mexico's Independence Day is celebrated on September 16th, and Chile's on September 18th.

Throughout Hispanic Heritage Month, various events and activities are organized across the United States, including festivals, art exhibitions, concerts, lectures, and educational programs. These events celebrate the rich cultural diversity, traditions, languages, and histories of Hispanic and Latino communities in the United



Facts About Hispanic Heritage Month & Hispanics

- ◆ Hispanic Heritage Month began in 1968 under President Johnson & was expanded to a month by President Reagan in 1988. President George Bush helped start Hispanic Heritage Week by sponsoring the original Hispanic Heritage Week bill. President Johnson's idea of Hispanic Heritage month was to honor the impact that Hispanic people have had in the U.S. He asked teachers to create celebratory curriculum about the accomplishments of the Hispanic people.
- ◆ It celebrates people living in the U.S. who have ancestors from countries where Spanish is the main language. Twenty percent of the United States population identifies as Hispanic. The heritage month always has a theme, it changes each year. In 2023, the theme for this year's Hispanic Heritage Month is *Latinos: Driving Prosperity, Power, and Progress in America*.
- ◆ In the U.S., Mexican Americans make up the largest Hispanic population. Approximately, 62% of the overall U.S. are Hispanic. Thirteen states, have at least 1 million Hispanic residents. (*Arizona, California, Colorado, Georgia, Illinois, New Jersey, Florida, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Washington*)
- ◆ The first Hispanic person in space was a woman named Ellen Ochoa. She was the first Latina astronaut in 1991.
- ◆ Sonia Sotomayor is the first Hispanic Supreme Court Justice in 2009.
- ◆ Philip Bazaar was the first Hispanic American who received a Medal of Honor. He was a member of the U.S Navy in the Civil War and earned his medal for bravery in 1865.
- ◆ Luis Walter Alvarez was the first Hispanic American to win the Nobel Price in physics in 1968 for his discovery of subatomic particles.


Celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month: The Life and Legacy of Cesar Chavez

Cesar Chavez was a tireless advocate for the rights of farmworkers and a prominent figure in the American labor movement during the 20th century. Born on March 31, 1927, in Yuma, Arizona, Chavez's early life was marked by the hardships faced by his Mexican-American family as they worked as migrant farm laborers in California.

Chavez's passion for social justice and workers' rights was ignited when he joined the Community Service Organization (CSO) in the 1950s.

In 1962, Chavez co-founded the United Farm Workers (UFW) with Dolores Huerta, a union dedicated to improving the deplorable working conditions endured by agricultural laborers, particularly those of Mexican and Filipino descent. Chavez's leadership and commitment to nonviolent protest strategies set the UFW apart from other labor unions.

One of the most significant accomplishments of Chavez and the UFW was the successful Delano Grape Strike, which began in 1965. This five-year-long strike and boycott sought better wages, safer working conditions, and the right to collective bargaining for farmworkers. Through boycotts, fasts, and peaceful protests, Chavez and the UFW gained widespread support and garnered attention for their cause.

Selena Quintanilla-Pérez - The Queen of Tejano Music

Selena Quintanilla-Pérez, widely known as Selena, was a beloved American singer, songwriter, and fashion icon. Born on April 16, 1971, in Lake Jackson, Texas, she rose to fame as the “Queen of Tejano Music” and left an indelible mark on the music industry before her tragic passing.

Selena's passion for music was evident from a young age. She began singing in her family's band, Selena y Los Dinos, where she quickly showcased her remarkable vocal talent and stage presence. Her fusion of

Tejano music with pop and R&B elements helped bridge cultural gaps and appeal to a diverse audience.

In 1987, Selena released her debut album, “Selena,” which marked the beginning of her meteoric rise to stardom. Her charismatic performances and chart-topping hits, such as “Como La Flor” and “Bidi Bidi Bom Bom,” earned her numerous accolades.

There are many fun activities to participate in like watching a movie, playing pool, outside games & sports along with access to computers for games & plenty of socializing.



The trip also included with free popcorn and drinks for all students attending.


Students had two movies to choose from at the theater: Blue Beetle and Gran Turismo.

My name is Manuel


Hernandez, & I am junior at Valley High school. I was born in Delano, Ca. in 2007. I've lived in Delano all my life.

I have grown up in Delano with both my parents who are both from Sinaloa. I have two sisters who are 10 & 29, and my brother who got to live up to 24.


For elementary, I attended Nueva Vista for all 5 years. I went to Almond Tree Middle School and then attended RFK. I was then transferred to Valley High School.

I plan on becoming an Esthetician in the future or an Ultrasound technician.


Some of my hobbies are cooking & sleeping. Most of my favorite songs are from Legado 7. There isn't much to me, other than sleeping all the time.
