Each month this section of the newsletter will be used to give kudos to one of our awesome staff members.


This month I would like to give Kudos to our incredible RSP



Classroom Management Hacks

Classroom Transitions

Effective transitions are a key component to the classroom environment and just like any other procedure, they are taught through explicit explanations, modeling, rehearsal, and review.

The three basic types of transition are:

Entering the classroom



Taking a seat



Switching between activities



Tips:

- Secure students' attention
 - o "Focus on me, please"
- Explain the procedure
 - "Return to your desks and take out your history books."
- Give a signal to start
 - "When I say "begin", you will quietly proceed."
- Initiate the transition
 - o "And....begin."
- Observe
 - Watch to make sure students are following directions.
